LHS Foods Class Partners With IL Pork Producers

April 4, 152 homes in the Lewistown and Bryant area were impacted by a storm, later classified as an EF3 tornado. The Salvation Army, the American Red Cross, local restaurants and individuals provided meals to the families affected and those helping them immediately and throughout the following two weeks.

On Friday, April 14 the Lewistown High School Foods class, under the leadership of teacher Nancy Williams, prepared and provided a meal for the community. The meal was made possible by the generosity of the Illinois Pork Producers, along with generous financial contributions from Compeer Financial, Havana State Bank, Ipava State Bank, Mid-America National Bank, Prairie State Bank and Trust, and Table Grove State Bank.

The meal consisted of ground pork patties (served as sandwiches), bacon-enhanced green beans, homemade macaroni and cheese, individually packaged carrots and celery, Texas Sheet Cake, and Rice Krispie treats. FCFB member and IL Pork Producer member Dan Williams of Smithfield supervised the grilling of the meat. Fifteen students were there to grill and serve.

Approximately 150 meals were served. Some meals were eaten on site. Some individuals came and took meals with them to be delivered where cleanup work was being completed. Leftovers were kept at the Bryant Village Hall (which served as the command center for cleanup supplies and gathering space for residents) for families to be served the next day, too.

Because donors were so generous, the class was able to deliver 50 boxes of granola bars and pop tarts that could be used as "grab and go" breakfast items.

Our goal was to help the individuals in need of a meal. Another goal was to encourage our students to help others. Hopefully the good feeling they received will encourage them to help others again later in life!

The Fulton County Farm Bureau Board of Directors met in regular session on Thursday, March 9, 2023, at the Farm Bureau office in Lewistown starting at 7:00 p.m. pursuant to due notice given. The meeting was called to order and presided over by President Barry Fisher. Other board members present were Robin Fisher, Jeff Shelby, David Tolley, Nick Cleer, Linda Rock, and Keely Wilcoxen . Absent were Jason Chatterton, Bob Vohland, Seth Vohland, Levi Porter and Johnathan Lock. Also present was Manager Elaine Stone.

There were no correspondences for the month. There were no Affiliate Reports

The first order of business was Election of officers. Bob Vohland was elected Vice President. Keely Wilcoxen was elected as Secretary. Linda Rock was elected as Tresurer.

The minutes from the February meeting were emailed and mailed out before the meeting for the board members to read. These were approved with no corrections.

Linda Rock discussed the financial

statements for February and January. These were placed on file for audit. The audit has been completed.

The Membership Report was given by Elaine. In total, we had 970 regular members in February, 13 professional members, and 1478 associate members for a total of 2461 members. Regular member dues notices have been sent out and are due April 2023. This year we used the "combo form" provided by IFB, meaning the cards are attached to the billing, eliminating a second mailing and those associated printing and postage costs. The membership was approved.




